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

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The report of the Chinese people attending the 16th ABU Dhabi International Wound Care Conference (ADWCC)

There are about 20 Chinese specialists attended the 16th Abu Dhabi Wound Care Conference (ADWCC)at April 10-11, 2025.

The congress's theme is "Person-Centered, Evidence-Based Wound Care," convened over 800 multidisciplinary experts from 50 countries to explore transformative strategies in wound management. The China delegation, comprising 19 members, played a pivotal role in shaping discussions, presenting groundbreaking research, and fostering international collaboration



China's Contributions: Spotlight on Research and Practice

The China delegation made significant contributions across oral presentations, poster sessions, and interactive discussions at ADWCC 2025. Wei Di (Hunan Cancer Hospital) presented a pioneering qualitative study on powerlessness in malignant fungating wound patients, applying the Health Ecological Model to identify key influencing factors-from physiological distress to systemic barriers-and proposing

Dr. Bharat Kotru (India) advocated for vascular reconstruction combined with biomaterials to salvage limbs, while Dr. Nick Marsden (UAE) emphasized soft tissue flap repair. These debates informed China's ongoing efforts to standardize diabetic

South Africa's Febe Bruwer introduced DRAWTEX SD100 compression bandages as a cost-effective alternative for venous ulcers, offering insights for resource-limited regions.

3. Probiotics and Novel Therapies

Najat Amharar (UAE) showcased probiotic applications to combat antibiotic-resistant infections, a strategy with high potential for China's rural wound care challenges.

4. Holistic Approaches to Cancerous Wounds

Prof. Kimberly LeBlanc (Canada) stressed multidimensional support-symptom control, family training, and psychological care-for malignant wounds, resonating with China's palliative care initiatives

China's Roadmap: Bridging Innovation and Equity

The delegation outlined actionable commitments to advance wound care:

Multidisciplinary Collaboration: Partner with global institutions to integrate AI, TCM, and biomaterials into education and practice.

Empowering Rural Healthcare: Scale tele-wound care programs and train community health workers, inspired by Abu Dhabi's integrated referral system.

Policy Advocacy: Lobby for expanded insurance coverage and national guidelines to reduce financial barriers.

Research Translation: Develop localized tools, such as Wei Di's proposed "powerlessness assessment scale," to guide clinical interventions.

targeted interventions like community-based support networks and policy reforms. His work sparked cross-cultural dialogues on psychological care, with Dr. Febe Bruwer (South Africa) praising its "patient-centered framework adaptable to diverse healthcare settings." Prof. Hua Zhang showcased digital health innovations through an "Internet Plus" stoma care platform, demonstrating improved rural patient compliance via remote monitoring. Poster sessions highlighted localized research, including Prof. Xiaomei Zhu's validation of a Chinese-language wound quality-of-life scale and Prof. Liping Tang's family dignity therapy model for cancerous wounds. Delegates actively shaped debates, advocating for TCM-integrated diabetic foot care and raising ethical considerations during AI discussions, with Prof. Yan Wang emphasizing "the need to balance technological efficiency with human dignity." These engagements underscored China's dual focus on advancing evidence-based practices while addressing socioeconomic disparities in wound management.



Conference Highlights: Global Trends Shaping Wound Care

Dr. Sandeep Gopalakrishnan (USA) demonstrated AI-powered wound assessment tools using convolutional neural networks (CNN) to analyze bacterial load and wound margins. This innovation aligns with China's goals to deploy AI in rural

The experience from an International Speaker

For the fifth time I reach the United Arab Emirates, for professional and scientific reasons. Just a few steps and you immediately enter the spiral of the 16 ADWCC conference and I realize that I am still immersed in a global atmosphere, in which differences are not created but rather merge.

We are here from all over the world and not by chance, but to express our studies, our research, our innovations and how much time is dedicated in the world, precisely, to patients of all ages affected by complex, chronic and, unfortunately, painful lesions.

The enormous merit of the Middle East is to be a continent at the center of the world and on the path of studies coming from every religion, every ethnicity, every skin, always with the respect and with that dignity that are part of civilizations, wherever they are. The great merit of the organizers is to favor meetings, debates and listening, reducing any type of overlapping to a minimum. The presentations follow one another and are of a high quality level using large and easy-to-reach classrooms and podiums. Greetings are myriads of gestures rich in a welcome that sometimes get lost in the old continent but here instead illuminate.

Respect for the quality of life encourages us to be brilliant, to expose each one to the best, with determination and passion, with competence and culture. There are no competitions, contests or mere exercises in protagonism: here young people shine, they make us dream for a better future without pressure sores, without amputations for a diabetic foot, following guidelines and protocols that are understandable and improvable because they are a work in progress.

The growth of this conference is not in the number of attendees, at least not only, but in the increase of countries that decide to be there and to establish balances, common studies, hugs for having met again after a long time. The enormous melting pop determines the success of a social project that disseminates wound care in countries that are often not so rich and hospitable and easy to reach.

I realize that I have to think more deeply, more devotedly to patients who are often not so fortunate as to receive European-style assistance, because giving one's skills and experience to those who have little is a fundamental obligation. The ADWCC has taught me a lot in this sense, in seeking the best possible solution in countries with low resources but high human potential.

The ADWCC has given me an Award this year that I will try to deserve in all the days that separate me from the next edition, because otherwise it would not have made sense. Thanks to those people who can be called friends for a common path that has made us better, thanks also to this slice of the world that leads us to think longer and better not about our universities and our hospitals but about our patients. often hard-to-heal-patients, always skins to be caressed with love.

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
